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I. THE CULTURE STUDIES FOR INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS AND VISITING SCHOLAR

Chinese visiting scholars participated in the study of American culture at the State University of New York Buffalo University. The scholars gained a deeper understanding of American culture by reading and discussing various books including the Bible.

Barb and Phil offered the American culture course designed for visiting Chinese scholars during the 2022 to 2023 academic year. Barb and Phil have been teaching American culture for many years. II. THE ANNUAL CHINA WEEK CONTINUED

The Center for China Study at the State University of New York Buffalo State University held a China-Week event from April 3rd to April 7th, in the Campbell Student Union. The main purpose of this event is to showcase the Chinese culture and promote exchanges of different cultures.

During China Week, scholars from the China Studies Center displayed artworks and handicrafts featuring traditional Chinese culture. Traditional Chinese culture is mainly based on Confucian culture, and the unifying theme of Confucianism is to advocate harmony; that is, harmony between individuals and nature, harmony between individuals and other individuals, and harmony between individuals and society. Many Chinese artworks and handicrafts

reflect the idea of harmony. For example, the structure and shape of Chinese porcelain pursues symmetry and uniformity, and the patterns and colors pursue the harmonious collocation of various colors and symmetrical lines. Most of the patterns are natural scenery such as mountains and rivers, and flowers and birds. The patterns on the fan, a traditional Chinese handicraft, represent good wishes, such as the combination of flowers and the moon to represent reunion, or pine and bamboo to represent people's noble

character. Another handicraft, the Chinese knot, is often made in bright red, representing luck, peace and auspice.

The artworks and traditional crafts on display during the Chinese Week include calligraphy, couplets, desk calendars, Chinese knots, small porcelain, paper cuttings, folding fans, lanterns, and Hanfu. Students from different countries and nationalities in Buffalo State University came to watch and exchange ideas with the scholars from the Center for China Studies. They talked about festival customs, clothes, food, and art. They exchanged different opinions and expressed their interests.

The holding of China Week activities has given people from different cultures a new understanding of other cultures, helped them form a more open cultural perspective, promoted mutual tolerance and respect among different cultures, and facilitated the harmony of the interpersonal environment.
