## The CCS Fall 2016 Seminar

The Center for China Studies Fall 2016 Seminar sponsored by the Office of International and Exchange Programs was successfully held in Classroom Building A307 on Tuesday October 11. Two graduate students from China offered presentations at the seminar.

Hu Kaiwen, from South China University of Technology, presented a lecture entitled "Architecture in China," which provided a detailed introduction to the ancient architecture of China. The types of ancient architecture in China are generally divided into four styles: palace architecture, garden architecture, residential architecture, and temple architecture. The students were most interested in Tu Lou from Fujian Province shown in the picture and asked a lot of questions about this style of architecture, which looks like a missile launching silo.



Liu Yue, from Hunan University of Science and Technology, gave a talk about her beautiful hometown of Xing Yi, a city located in an area where Guizhou, Yunnan and Guangxi Provinces intersect. Because of the abundant gold deposits in this region and the rapid development of gold-related industries it was named "China's Golden Prefecture" in 2005. Liu Yue used videos and pictures to introduce the beautiful scenery, pleasant climate, and colorful culture of her hometown. The CCS Seminars offered each semester at Buffalo State help to broaden the international perspective of college students and provide an important venue for cultural exchange between Chinese and Americans.
