his semester the Center for China Studies, the Social Work Department, and the Research Foundation hosted ten officials from the China Ministry of Civil Affairs interested in learning more about how private, not-for-profit, and government health and human services agencies operate in the United States. They took a week-long course offered by the Social Work Department and visited agencies that address such issues as senior citizens, addiction and rehabilitation, and at-risk youth. Particular emphasis was given to community-based organizations in Western New York. The visitors also met with Buffalo State faculty and administrators at a welcoming banquet presided by President Muriel Howard on September 19. Buffalo State was chosen as the host institution because of the China Center's relationship and collaboration with Chinese officials and researchers.

# NIMH Training for China Research Project Continues on Campus

Nine Chinese professors specializing in the areas of mental health, public health, psychology, and epidemiology have received or are still receiving training on campus this year for a research project funded by the National Institute of Mental Health (NIMH). According to Dr. Zhang Jie, principal investigator and director of the four-year project, a major aim of the research is to identify correlates and test a strain theory of suicide among Chinese rural young women, who are at a particularly high risk of suicide.

Dr. Pan Guowei, Dr. Feng Yiping, and Dr. Yu Lianzheng are from the Liaoning Center for Disease Control in Shenyang; Dr. Xu Huilan, Dr. Zhou Liang, Dr. Wu Hongbo, and Dr. Xiao Shuiyuan are from the Central South University School of Public Health in Changsha; Dr. Jia Cunxian is from the Shandong University School of Public Health in Jinan; and Dr. Song Zhenshao is from Beijing Normal University's Psychology Department. Their presence on campus has also brought diversity, knowledge, and new culture to our faculty and students.

# Buffalo State Is Active in China During Summer 2005

Dr. Virginia Grabiner, associate professor and chair of Buffalo State's Sociology Department, and Dr. Gene Grabiner, professor of sociology at Erie Community College spent more than six weeks this past summer at Xi'an International Studies University. Virginia presented several multimedia lectures, including "100 Years of American Popular Music" and a showing and lecture on that most American of films, "The Wizard of Oz."
