There were several activities and cities visited. In Beijing, the delegation visited the Tiananmen

Square and the Palace Museum (known as Forbidden City), the Emperors' tombs of Ming Dynasty and the Underground Palace, as well as the Great Wall. A professional visit to Capital Normal University was made, where the delegation participated in the opening ceremony of the East and West Joint Exhibit of Textile Designs. The delegation then traveled to Xi'an, and a professional visit was made to Xi'an Foreign Language University. While in Xi'an, several stops were made at the underground ruins, the Huaqing Hot Springs, the Shaanxi Provincial Museum, the Big Wild Goose Pagoda, and the City Wall Park. The delegation also traveled to Dalian and visited the Xing Hai Park, the Natural Museum and Dalian Harbor. A professional visit by the delegation was made to Dalian Medical University.

## The East and West Joint Exhibit a Great Success in Beijing

The recent trip to China began with a visit to Capital Normal University in Beijing. The delegation had just traveled from seven feet of snow in Buffalo and all were prepared for similar winter weather conditions in China. The first day (along with the remainder of the trip) was exceptionally beautiful, it was a warm sunny day. The delegation arrived at the University and walked through the campus renewing friendships. We arrived at the gallery just as the opening ceremony for "Inspirational Chinese Designs: East West Interpretations" was about to begin. The opening ceremony was officially held at the

fine arts gallery of Capital Normal University in Beijing, China, January 4, 2002. Attendees included the Buffalo State delegation, representatives from Capital Normal University, educators, professionals from the industry, and the general public.

In addition to the collections that Professors Elaine Polvinen and Shen Li developed, Professor Yimeei Wang from Fu Jen University in Taipei, Taiwan was invited to join the collaborative project. She developed a second east interpretation collection that was part of the Beijing exhibit. Mr. Wang Qing, the President of the China Fashion Designers Association was there to officially welcome the Buffalo State College delegation.



The formal opening ceremony included commentary from Liu Limin, the Vice President of Capital Normal University, Sun Zhijun, the dean of Fine Arts, Mr Wang Qing, China Fashion Designers Association, and Dr. Delores Battle, Senior advisor to the President from Buffalo State College. Several interviews were requested by a reporter for China Fashion Weekly.

Representatives from the Beijing University were very pleased to see interdisciplinary projects between China and the US. They repeatedly expressed their support for any type of cross-cultural project that integrates with and informs other cultures in the world about Chinese culture.

The exhibition is scheduled to open at Upton Gallery at Buffalo State College September 15th to October 8th, 2002. A delegation from Capital Normal University and Professor Yimeei Wang from Fu Jen University will be traveling to Buffalo State for the opening reception.

## Harvard Fellow Discussed Mental Health of Chinese

On February 15, 2002, the Center for China Studies along with the Center for Health and Social Research sponsored the Spring 2002 Seminar entitled "Mental Health Issues of Asian Minorities." Dr. Xiao Shuiyuan, currently a Freeman Fellow at Harvard University Medical School and Professor at Hunan Medical University School of Public Health in China, was the guest lecturer. Dr. Xiao Shuiyuan, discussed and demonstrated challenges and difficulties that Asian minorities are dealing with as well as discussed ways future medicine will attempt to advance and alleviate these existing problems. Dr. Xiao Shuiyuan provided information about what the community can do to help this current dilemma and methods pertaining to future prevention. With this infor-

mation, the audience left with a better understanding of what can be done, on a community level, to help this current problem and were better educated on methods of prevention.



## Exhibit on Modern China on Buffalo State Campus

As China strides confidently into the twenty-first century, the country's importance as a major political and economic force in the world community is becoming increasingly evident. Its recent admission to the World Trade Organization and the decision of the International Olympic Committee to grant Beijing the honor of hosting the 2008 Summer Olympics are just two of the many signs that China is assuming an important new role in international affairs. With this in mind, Buffalo State College's Center for China Studies and the Department of History and Social Studies Education organized a photograph and artifact exhibit entitled "China's New Century and the Buffalo State Connection." The exhibit, which was on display in Butler Library from March 15th to March 30th, highlighted the fascinating mix of tradition and modernity that one finds in China today. It also acquainted the Buffalo State community with the work of the Center for China Studies and the new opportunities for China-related research and exchange now open to Buffalo State students and faculty.

The exhibit was sponsored by a mini-grant from the Office of Equity and Campus Diversity and

was scheduled to correspond with International Awareness Week. The seventy photographs and numerous artifacts that comprised the exhibit were gathered, for the most part, from the members of a Buffalo State College delegation that visited China this past January. Through the Center for China Studies, Buffalo State College has recently established formal relations with three Chinese universities: Capital Normal University (Beijing), Xi'an Foreign Language Institute (Xi'an), and Dalian Medical University (Dalian). These three schools, along with some remarkable scenes from the cities in which they are located, constituted the theme of the exhibit. The various photographs and artifacts were beautifully organized and arranged by Cynthia Conides, Assistant Professor in the Department of History and Social Studies Education, and some of her students in the Department's recently established Museum Curatorship program.



At the opening ceremony of the exhibit, held in Butler Library on Friday March 15th, the Buffalo State community heard a brief presentation by Professor Zhao Huimin, the Deputy Consul General of the People's Republic of China from New York City. Professor Zhao was officially welcomed to Buffalo by Dr. Dolores Battle, Senior Advisor to the President and director of the Office of Equity and Campus Diversity. In his presentation, Professor Zhao praised the exhibit as yet another sign of America's growing interest in China and extended a formal welcome to those interested in coming to China to initiate new projects and exchanges. Professor Zhao was accompanied to Buffalo by two other distinguished members of the consular staff, Kong Jing and Jiang Yu, both of whom also offered brief presenta-

tions. Finally, Mr. Ted Turkle, director of the Buffalo State College Research Foundation, extended his gratitude to Professor Zhao and his associates for visiting Buffalo State College and warmly praised the exhibit organizers for their excellent work.

Judging from the comments of the students, faculty, and staff who took the opportunity to view "China's New Century and the Buffalo State Connection," the exhibit was a great success and served as an interesting and informative presentation of the work of the Center for China Studies.
