## III. Visiting Scholars Participated in Faculty Organization's Events

Visiting Chinese Scholars participated in this year's Labor Day Parade held in September, 2022. This year's parade was the first parade since the parade's cancelation in 2020 and 2021. The Chinese Scholars learned of the history of US labor movements and the importance of the Labor Day parade. The first-ever Labor Day parade, held in New York City in 1882, was directed by a union, the Central Labor Union. Labor Day is a celebration of organized labor, a day to remember and pay tribute to those who have fought and struggled for better, safer working conditions and fair pay. It's also a day to look forward, to stand up and speak out for positive change, and to continue fighting those who strive to destroy unions.

UUP United University Professions is the union organization of American college teachers. UUP supported this Labor Day activity by inviting all university teachers in Buffalo to come out and show their union pride by marching with their union in the Labor Day parade this year. It was great to be part of the Nation's celebration of workers and unions.

Peng Zhuang, an associate professor from Xinxiang University in China, is now a visiting scholar to Buffalo State. She majors in communication and her research focus is film and documentary communication. She is a documentary filmmaker and made several award-winning documentaries in the past 5 years. The War of Baoqing, an hour-long documentary about Baoqing, a young man with Cerebral Palsy living in Taihang Mountains in Central China, explores the life and philosophy in Baoqing's situation. It was made in 2017 and won awards at Chinese documentary festivals.

Professor Michael I. Niman and Professor Dorothea Braemer from the Communication Department hosted this event. Professor Zhang Jie from the Sociology Department, Tricia L. # VI. American Culture Studies: Cutting the traditional Jack-o-lantern



On Friday, September 30, Chinese visiting scholars at Buffalo State were invited by Mr. Phil Klumpp and Mrs. Barb Klumpp to their house to learn to carve traditional Jack-o-lantern. Mr. and Mrs. Klumpp offered a course entitled American Culture

for Chinese visiting scholars every week. This event is a good way for the visiting scholars to experience more American culture.

Step by step, Mr. and Mrs. Klumpp taught the scholars how to make the Jack-o-lantern. They each chose a pumpkin, then dug out the pumpkin's hat, took out the pumpkin seeds, and then drew their favorite patterns on the pumpkin with pencils, carved them, and finally put in the candles. Mr. and Mrs. Klumpp also invited Chinese visiting scholars and various international students studying at Buffalo State to experience the Great American Canal on August 27, 2022. It is located in Lockport, New York, in Niagara County. The Erie Canal was once the most important of America's inland waterways. Put into service in 1825, it facilitated the opening of the American frontier and provided a route west for tens of thousands of settlers and immigrants. Villages, towns, and cities were born along its route while commerce spread from the Hudson Valley to the Midwest. The Erie Canal transformed New York into the Empire State and the nation into an economic power.

The Great American Canal was enlarged from 1834 to 1862, and again in the 1890s. The canal finally underwent its last and largest expansion, opening as the New York State Barge Canal in 1918. Now recreational use has become its primary function.

Mr. and Mrs. Klumpp introduced the history and working principles of the Erie Canal to the visiting scholars. Through the visit to Erie Canal, everyone has a greater understanding of the history and culture of the United States. (Hui Ying)

**Zhuang Peng** is an associate professor from Xinxiang University in China, a Ph.D. candidate at University Putra Malaysia in Communication, is now a visiting scholar to Buffalo State. Dr. Lyu is an academic committee member of Psychological Crisis Intervention Committee of China Mental Health Association, Medical Statistics Professional Committee of Chinese Medical Education Association, Applied Statistics Association of Shandong, and Clinical Epidemiology Association of Shandong. He has been a peer reviewer for many SCI and SSCI journals. As an active researcher, Dr. Lyu has presided over 6 provincial or ministerial academic projects. He has been awarded two science and technology awards and one outstanding achievement award of humanities and social sciences for universities. He has published more than 40 academic papers in Chinese academic core, SCI and SSCI journals, and more than 10 academic books as chief editor or associate editor.

**Zhang Bo** is a Business Management Professor and has served at Tourism College of Beijing Union University. His major is ecotourism and conducts research of Rural Tourism and Tourism Industry. He studied postdoctoral research work in the Chinese Academy of Social Sciences Institute of Urban Development and Environment. His work includes teaching Operation Management and Organizational Behavior.

**Lyu Xiaojie** is a Professor of Modern Literature, at Zhengzhou University of Light Industry, China. Focusing on the study of regional writer groups and local culture, she has published more than 20 articles in high-ranking journals and five books, and led eight projects on regional culture. She won the social science Outstanding Achievement Award of Henan Province China in 2016 and won the title of Outstanding teacher at her university in 2021.
